Handbook Summary 2023

The Bachelor of Education (Early Childhood) is a 4 year degree specifically designed as an initial teacher qualification, equipping graduates with the specialist knowledge and skills to teach effectively in early childhood settings with children from Birth to 5 years. Students will attend an on-campus intensive workshop block prior to each professional practice placement. Students will also develop a professional e-portfolio throughout the course of the degree to demonstrate their capacity to work successfully as a graduate teacher.

Handbook Summary 2024

The Bachelor of Education (Early Childhood) equips graduates to teach effectively across the early childhood sector with children Birth - 5 years and their families. Early childhood teachers play a pivotal role in children's learning, development and wellbeing. Students will learn how to foster children's creativity, curiosity, imagination and resilience through an integrated and responsive play-based curriculum. Students will build leadership and advocacy skills to prepare for their professional role working in diverse communities.

The program is flexible, providing both on campus and/or online learning options to accommodate the wide range of student commitments. Study options include part time, full time and accelerated mode. Students will undertake professional experience in early childhood education and care settings.

Program Logic

The Program Logic is embedded throughout all Initial Teacher Education programs at Western Sydney University. It explains how each subject contributes to the journey to become a Graduate Teacher. The Program Logic includes three phases: Foundation, Development and Transition. In each of these phases, pre-service teachers develop essential knowledge and skills by learning about evidence-based pedagogies and practices, enabling their successful transition to teaching.

Foundation: Pre-service teachers will develop fundamental knowledge, skills, and attributes to support the beginning of their journey to become a teacher.

Development: Pre-service teachers will strengthen their pedagogical content knowledge, understanding of classroom management, and evidence-based pedagogical practices.

Transition: Pre-service teachers will consolidate the knowledge, skills, and attributes required for success as a Graduate Teacher, using evidence to inform and strengthen pedagogical practice.
