Subject Content

5. Writing skills: identify and apply foundational features of academic and professional language
6. Writing skills: summarising and paraphrasing,
7. Writing skills: grammar, sentence and paragraph structure
8. Writing skills: achieving coherence and cohesion
9. Academic integrity skills: citation and paraphrasing skills
10. Public speaking and professional presentation of ideas
