Description In an interconnected, globalised and complex world, diplomatic dialogue on multiple levels has become increasingly important for peaceful relations. This subject provides an introduction to the important and prestigious arena of diplomatic practice for students interested in an international career. Transnational diplomacy takes into consideration the perspective of multiple international actors in dealing with contemporary challenges including states, international organisations, and non-state actors. In considering multi-track diplomacy in the context of contemporary bilateral, regional, and multilateral relations, you will have the opportunity to engage with senior diplomats from Australia and elsewhere. Students will participate in a simulated soft power diplomacy campaign built upon the rich cultural diversity and international connections unique to Western Sydney, equipping you with real-world skills to effectively represent your country or organisation at an international level.
