Description This subject will specifically enable students to investigate, discuss and develop an understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' sense of identity, culture, and health. Health statistics, as well as historical and contemporary practice issues will be identified. In addition, the subject will explore strategies that have been implemented to address inequities in health outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families. Further, the subject promotes the development of critical knowledge essential for students to understand their own values, beliefs, biases, and perceptions to become culturally sensitive and appropriately adaptable when meeting the health needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and families.

4. Identify effective strategies for health promotion and health maintenance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families
5. Explain the importance of cultural safety and culturally appropriate care and service provision for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples
6. Apply critical reflection on own values and attitudes towards cultural safety and the provision of health care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families

 - Historical events and health care policies - relate the impact it has had on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander maternal and infant health

 - Closing the gap
4. Ethical care in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations
 - Birthing on Country
 - Models, theories and cultural care
 - Working in partnership
